Held virtually from October 19-22, this four-day event brought together researchers, policymakers, practitioners, students and stakeholders from all sectors, and highlighted the evolving environmental factors influencing the current global health landscape.

Members from our very own Community of Practice presented on Linking Knowledge and Expertise to Enhance Climate Change-related Health Research and Practice. The symposium explored critical mechanisms required to underpin an emerging CoP on climate change and health, with the Working Group on Climate Change and Health acting as the co-ordinating hub and used the BCCI model as a successful CoP. Presenters addressed the following questions:

- What does a successful CoP look like?
- What are the critical roles and expected outcomes for a climate changerelated health CoP?
